



Modern Foreign Languages Policy

Introduction

At West Cliff, our children are offered the opportunity to learn about different cultures and understand diversity. MFL helps all of our children to broaden their experiences and understanding of languages and apply this to everyday life. We believe that learning a foreign language provides a valuable educational, social and cultural experience for all pupils.

We have chosen to teach French, partly because this subject is available at the local secondary schools and partly due to staff interest, ability and experience.

In KS2, children have approximately 30 minutes per week of languages. Although formal teaching of French doesn't begin until Year 3, our younger pupils are exposed to the language through basic vocabulary and activities, such as answering the register by saying, 'Bonjour.'

The curriculum

All pupils in KS2 have a weekly French lesson. We have chosen to follow the North Yorkshire County Council scheme of learning for French, which is divided into units, as shown on the overview below.



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The scheme of learning has been designed to align with the National Curriculum (2014) and lays the foundations for further foreign language teaching at Key Stage 3 (secondary). Pupils are taught to

- listen attentively to spoken language and show understanding by joining in and responding
- explore the patterns and sounds of language through songs and rhymes and link the spelling, sound and meaning of words
- engage in conversations; ask and answer questions; express opinions and respond to those of others; seek clarification and help
- speak in sentences, using familiar vocabulary, phrases and basic language structures
- develop accurate pronunciation and intonation so that others understand when they are reading aloud or using familiar words and phrases
- present ideas and information orally to a range of audiences
- read carefully and show understanding of words, phrases and simple writing
- appreciate stories, songs, poems and rhymes in the language
- broaden their vocabulary and develop their ability to understand new words that are introduced into familiar written material, including through using a dictionary
- write phrases from memory, and adapt these to create new sentences, to express ideas clearly
- describe people, places, things and actions orally and in writing
- understand basic grammar appropriate to the language being studied, including (where relevant): feminine, masculine and neuter forms and the conjugation of high-frequency verbs; key features and patterns of the language; how to apply these, for instance, to build sentences; and how these differ from or are similar to English.

Each unit provides pupils with opportunities to practise their spoken French, as well as activities to read and write in the target language. Sessions are fun and interactive, with electronic and physical resources to support learning.

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Assessment

All pupils in KS2 have an individual French book where their learning is recorded, as appropriate and following the recommendations in the NYCC scheme of learning.

Formative assessment takes place during and/or after each lesson and additional support and/or resources are available as required. Assessment can include peer and self-marking, where appropriate.

The scheme of learning includes an end of unit assessment for each unit, an example of which is shown below. These enable pupils and staff to reflect on the learning to date and to assess progress against the learning objectives.

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Progression

As pupils move up through the school, the learning objectives of each unit become progressively more challenging so that our pupils leave Year 6 well-prepared to continue their MFL learning when they start at secondary school.

Monitoring

Teaching and learning in Modern Foreign Languages (French) is monitored by the Subject Leader, who has extensive experience of teaching primary French.

A variety of methods are used for monitoring, including pupil interviews, learning walks and book scrutiny.

Curriculum Links

Learning another language presents opportunities for the reinforcement of knowledge, skills and understanding developed in other curriculum areas. These opportunities can be exploited through aspects of:

- Literacy: development of speaking and listening skills, knowledge and understanding of grammar and sentence construction.
- Computing: use of online foreign language materials, presentation of data, word-processing, use of apps.
- PSCHE: the multilingual society, knowledge of other countries and cultures.
- Numeracy: counting, calculations, the time and the date, money.
- Geography: work relating to the study of other countries, points of the compass, weather.
- Science: work on parts of the body and animals.
- Music: rhyming, rhythm, singing, composition, world music.
- RE: international or multicultural work, celebration of festivals, storytelling, calendars, customs.
- History: work relating to the study of other countries, family trees of famous people.
- Art: the lives of foreign artists.

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• PE: physical responses to the teacher's instructions issued in the language being learnt.
